The High Holidays bring with them an increased focus on our choices. "Choose life," the Torah urges us. Our traditional prayer dialogue is of blessings and curses, of turning and returning, of open gates and opportunities for change. The High Holidays are also a time when we are to think about our conduct toward one another with a special focus on the words we say.

We are reminded that our words are like feathers scattered from a pillow into the wind, easy to spread and nearly impossible to take back. In our liturgy, we are urged to be mindful, not just of what we have said and done, but of what we might yet say and do. Shofar blasts awaken us from our stupor, our state of insensitivity about our habitual conduct, if not from something more like slumber.

In our services, we will hear the words, "Atem Nitza-vim!" "You stand this day," reminding all of us that we are under inspection and judgment. For some of us, this will be taken in the traditional way, standing before God, soul bared, the ledger of good and not-so-good deeds open alongside the Book of Life. For others among us, it will be we ourselves gazing inward in Heshbon Nefesh, an accounting of the soul, as we consider the way we live our lives, our past, present, and future.

This year, we find ourselves amid a political climate full of often heated discussion and debate. Political discussions too easily devolve into name-calling, labeling, and worse. This High Holidays, may we be particularly mindful of our dialogue with one another.

While we may feel impassioned about our opinions, let us be aware that others are equally impassioned about theirs. May we pay attention to our conduct and the words that we say. Let us choose life for our relationships and our community by being respectful of one another.

Remember that Moses' anger at the people ultimately cost him the opportunity to enter the Promised Land. How much more so may anger let loose irresponsibly damage our relationships? We are only human. Let us work together to bring the most blessings into our lives and to make our community the best place it can be.

The Origins of Leaving a Visitation Stone

The Jewish Cemetery Association of Massachusetts offers a wonderful explanation of why we leave stones on a tombstone.

One of the most common Jewish cemetery customs is to leave a small stone at the grave of a loved one after saying Kaddish or visiting. Its origins are rooted in ancient times and throughout the centuries the tradition of leaving a visitation stone has become part of the act of remembrance.

The origin of this custom began long ago, when the deceased was not placed in a casket, but rather the body was prepared, washed, and wrapped in a burial shroud, or for a male, in his tallis (prayer shawl). Then the body would be placed in the ground, covered with dirt and then large stones would be placed atop the gravesite, preventing wild animals from digging up the remains. Over time, individuals would go back to the gravesite and continue to place stones, ensuring the security of

the site and as a way to build up the "memory" of the loved one.

As time passed on, and carved monuments became the preferred memorial, the custom of leaving a visitation stone became a symbolic gesture — a way for the visitor to say to the loved one, "I remember you..."

The Temple B'nai Jeshurun Youth Group provides now for this custom at Woodland Cemetery by the Younker Mausoleum and the Gordon Garden at the entrance to the Jewish Section.

The Temple Youth Group has also placed stones at Glendale Cemetery. We have placed 5 clay pots with small stones for our visitors to leave, so you too, can continue on with this ancient custom of remembering throughout the Cemetery. Please watch for those.

A big thank you goes out to Jody Kolmen for all her advice and help with this project.

Executive Director's Message

As the High Holidays quickly approach our staff has been hard at work ensuring that all the arrangements have been made for these sacred days. On top of all the planning and preparation we also have received numerous inquiries about our High Holidays schedule. Those of you who receive our bulletin have had that schedule for quite a while, but there are quite a few people who contact us who are either new to the area, visiting Des Moines during this time, or are not yet affiliated with a congregation.

One thing that makes our congregation so special is that everyone is welcome to join us for the High Holidays (even non members). That is one thing that really surprises people who contact us from out of town. Some can hardly believe that a congregation our size doesn't require tickets for the High Holidays. Again, this is something truly unique and special about our congregation that allows us to be a welcoming community.

One of the main reasons we don't have to have tickets for the High Holidays is that every year so many of you come forward to sponsor the many different costs of High Holidays services. Already we have had some people come forward to sponsor the flowers for our services, and the Break the Fast meal after Yom Kippur. We would love to see more people come forward to sponsor the other aspects of our High Holiday services.

- Every year we offer baby-sitting so families with young children can feel welcome (\$1,000).
- We contract off-duty police officers to provide security so everyone can feel safe at our services (\$1,500).
- We contract musicians and instrumentalists to provide beautiful music that helps create a sense of the sacred during services (\$5,500).
- We get permits and barricades to provide parking on Grand Avenue for those with mobility issues (\$500).
- We contract caterers to provide a luncheon during Rosh Hashanah, our Break the Fast Meal after Yom Kippur, and snacks for children throughout the High Holidays (\$1,000).
- We purchase candy, glow sticks, and all kinds of other worship supplies to make our services engaging for all ages (\$500).

BREAK-THE-FAST - Kugel, cheese & crackers and desserts are needed. Please let the Temple office know what you will bring.

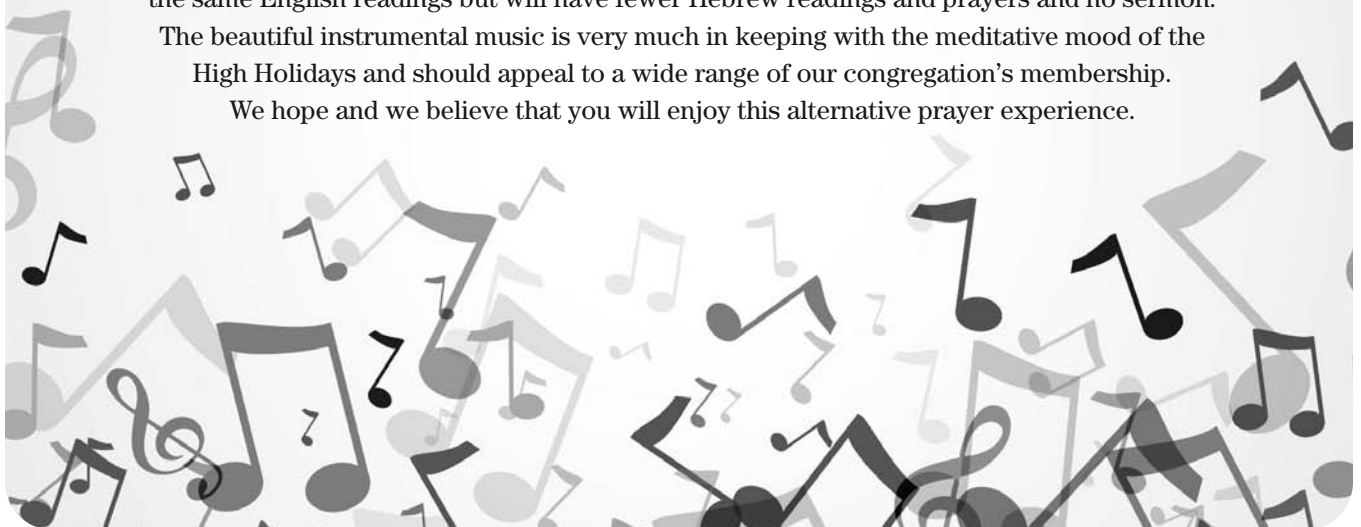
Instrumental Voices –High Holiday Services

This year, like the last two years, we will be holding one regular evening service for both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, which will feature our enhanced professional and volunteer choir and a sermon. Following these services will be a newly created alternative service featuring instrumental voices - violin, viola, cello, flute and piano, instead of choral ones.

The Instrumental Voices services will be shorter than the regular evening services and will run from approximately 9:00 to 10:00 p.m. following our regular evening services which will run from approximately 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. The Instrumental Voices service will feature the same English readings but will have fewer Hebrew readings and prayers and no sermon.

The beautiful instrumental music is very much in keeping with the meditative mood of the High Holidays and should appeal to a wide range of our congregation's membership.

We hope and we believe that you will enjoy this alternative prayer experience.

Welcome New Members!

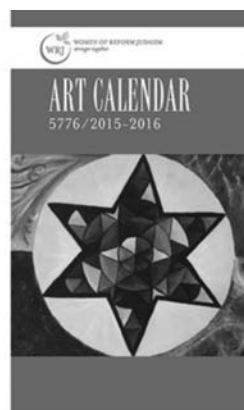

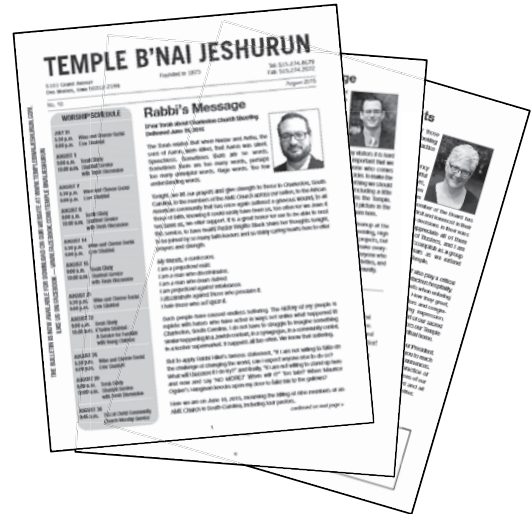
